A Sister Who Loved the Lord: Reflections On My Sister's Recent Passing

I always called her "Sue," although later in life she changed her name to Sienna. We were the "two little kids" since we had three older brothers, and then there was Sue and I, the youngest of five children.

Our lives growing up had a good deal of imagination and adventure since our family moved often and we attended several different schools. We had city memories from a neighborhood elementary school, Norm's store with candy across the street, and attending the Prospect Avenue Baptist Church downtown. We had many suburban memories too, and for a while we had a fantasy of moving to the "Kentucky Hills," wherever they are. We both attended a rural camp named Cherry Valley, near Olean, NY. That is where I first gave my heart to Jesus, praying outside a cabin with our counselor.

We shared many church memories because we were church kids who enjoyed going to church. She was the first to discover a little unorthodox Christian coffeehouse that opened in our village, and our experiences there were the seeds planted for our later going to Bible school, and my going into the ministry.

Sienna was a spiritual mentor to me and we both liked obtaining helpful and interesting Bibles. Rarely did I go to her house when she had not ordered a new Bible online, and I gave many of her Bibles away over the years. I still have the first Bible she gave me, and I showed it to her on one of my last visits with her in the hospital. In pencil inside the front cover is a simple inscription: "To Tim, from Sue."

In recent years Sienna called me frequently, often at night. "What is your sermon about?" she might ask. She talked about her children and grandchildren—whom she adored. It was such a highlight for her to attend the baptisms of her grandsons this past year. Her faith was strong and she wanted her family to share in that faith.

Sienna met the love of her life at a little ministry outreach we had in the Allentown district of Buffalo called *Jesus for You*. I have never seen a deeper and longer-lasting devotion to a spouse as I have seen in Ned.

Although I will miss the other "little kid," the comfort I have is in knowing that her long-term suffering with MS is over, and she is in the presence of the Lord—a presence she pursued since an early age. She had hoped and dreamed of physical healing, and now that he aling has taken place—just differently than she desired.

Sienna was a sister and more: she was a friend and spiritual advisor, a lover of God and his word. Her life will live on in the many people she touched directly or indirectly, such as through her writings.

These are the last two stanzas of a poem she wrote titled,

My Comfort:
Jesus, you're my all in all.
Help me never trip or fall.
Hold my hand on Zion's Mount—
Holy Spirit, be my fount.
Through the desert, I must go—
Barren region, here below—
Past the wilderness I see,
How your Spirit cared for me.





Three Essential Things

This article is a bit of a rewrite but, from a different point of view... it's not that old, four years or so... but it's what God has laid on my heart... so here we go again.

If asked, each of us could probably list a number of attributes that are necessary for a church to thrive. But I don't think the list needs to be that long. As a

matter of fact I suspect that the longer the list the more we confound ourselves regarding our purpose and obscure our call. But I can think of 3 things that I believe ought to be on that list.

The first is **Energy**.... I think that a church that is rooted in Jesus possesses a certain energy, or an enthusiasm, that demonstrates that the Holy Spirit is alive and working. This energy or enthusiasm is not the type that we can summon for ourselves. Oh, we like to think we can, but no... at least not with the very best results. In everything, but especially when doing God's work (btw everything we do is, in fact, God's work) we must draw our energy from our vine, our root, our life source, and not rely only on ourselves. If I decide to go work in my garden I can summon enough energy to make that happen with reasonable results. But if I attempt to teach a Bible study I have to draw my energy and guidance from the Holy Spirit. Because teaching God's Word requires so much more of me than I possess in and of myself. I often joke about teaching by the seat of the Holy Spirit's pants. Now, I'm pretty sure the Holy Spirit doesn't actually wear pants... what I'm really saying is that I strive to remain wide open to the spirit's leading. I don't own the lesson I'm teaching, Jesus does. And because of that it is necessary for me to stay in tune with the Holy Spirit. Sometimes that results in unplanned conversations and topical detours that I'm not sure I'm prepared for. But the result is always, always fruitful, and I am continually amazed and thankful for the many ways that the Holy Spirit prepares me, sustains me, and works powerfully through me or in spite of me. And that's just plain cool!

We do not own our acts of service that we perform for the church, for each other, for the community, for whomever. When we surrender our service to Jesus with the guidance of the Holy Spirit our efforts result in experiences that produce an energy and enthusiasm that wells within us and that we can draw on for the next thing we are called to. Energy and enthusiasm are infectious and will spread throughout our church family if only we will embrace it and share it.

The second is **Grace** ... I think that a church that thrives receives and offers a whole lot of grace. John Wesley understood grace as God's everlasting kindness in our lives, or unmerited favor. It is ours because God chooses to offer it to us not because we have earned it. It is offered, but it's not there for the taking... grace is a gift, and gifts to be truly accepted must be received with open hands and open hearts. There's a difference between taking and receiving. Think about it!

Grace is a gift that is always available to us, but we must choose to receive it and we must choose to offer it to others. We can also refuse the gift. It is our choice... we can choose not to receive God's grace and we can choose not to offer grace to anyone else. In order to thrive though we must choose to both receive grace and to offer it to anyone else who needs it, whether they know they need it or not and whether they want it or not. Grace isn't ours to save with the intent to offer only on special occasions or only to those we deem worthy. Grace is a lot like manna, if we try to hoard it, it will rot in our hands, worse yet... in our hearts.

A thriving church must be a conduit of grace. I think that if grace does not flow freely into us and through us it's largely because our hearts are in conflict. Conflicted hearts are often too proud to receive and often feel too poor to give. If we will surrender our conflicted hearts to Jesus and choose to be receivers and offerors of grace, we will find we can have hearts at peace..... and hearts at peace are poised to thrive.

The third attribute is **Integrity**. This one can be tougher, we might get a little caught up in defining it rather than modeling it. My ethics course for tax prep says that "Integrity requires consistent honesty and candor which must not be subordinated to personal gain or advantage." Some definitions of Christian integrity hang on Proverbs 20:7 which says the righteous shall lead blameless lives. Well, none of us lead blameless lives... and we can't make ourselves righteous, at least not the righteousness of God. It's about relationship. It's messy. David screwed up royally and yet God called him a man after His own heart. Somehow along the way it seems that being right has become a primary tenet of integrity. But this is wrong... being right is not a vital component of Christian integrity, doing right is. We all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God... what makes for integrity is continually reconciling our hearts back to God, and living obediently to His call as we prayerfully discern it. It is as simple and as complicated as that.

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY OCTOBER 1, 2023


