

A Year of Change

Yes, it is the Christmas season and one would expect the pastor to write on the themes of Advent or Christmas, but I want to take this opportunity to reflect on the past year.

Our worship services continue to be meaningful. Sermons have been Bible-based and usually in a series. Our worship in music is quite good for a small church, and I am grateful to Jen, Rick, and Ian for their faithfulness each week. We usually combine a couple hymns with contemporary praise songs. I would like to see even more participate in the prayer time, but in 2023 there were four people who participated at least once. Dan Thurber, who—along with his wife-- is known here, is someone I have called upon to fill in to preach at times.

Our online audience on Sunday has grown some, part of it being relatives and friends watching. I wish those who are physically able would join with us in person. Zooming with family across the country is different than being together for a meal. You get the analogy.

Before the worship service begins each week, there are small Sunday school groups that meet at 9:00 a.m. The children and youth meet during the school year, and there is one adult class in the library, usually taught by Anne Hyndman.

This has, in all honesty, been a challenging year for our church. During my first six months or so here, we were moving in a strong direction. Our attendance was going in a positive direction and there was a sense of expectancy and hopefulness. The recent travails of the United Methodist Church are well known, and although we have not made any radical changes in our local church, the larger denomination seems to be moving in a more liberal direction. So, unfortunately, we lost several people due to their disapproval of the direction of the UMC. Our relationship with the larger UMC here at Lyndonville is minimal, and there is no mandate that we change anything here. But the affiliation with the larger body was a breaking point for those who left. It has been a discouraging season seeing the empty spots in the sanctuary and needing to deal with smaller financial support.

Well, I do not mean to depress you this Christmas season! But I wanted to share some of what has been going on this past year. I am looking forward to this Advent season, and then beginning a long-term sermon series based on the book of Acts in the new year. Remember us in prayer. The Christian life is not all smooth sailing! Churches across America are struggling these days, post-Covid. The gospel of Jesus Christ is the hope for the world. Who knows, 2024 could be a year of new beginnings, transformed lives, and a greater

sense of who we should be as a church in this place and time.

Cliches for Christmas

"It just doesn't feel like Christmas"... Ever utter those words in mid-December when your cookies are half-baked, mass texting keeps your phone buzzing, you're not done sending out Christmas cards and you just spilled coffee on the stamps, the dogs are barking at the cat swatting bulbs

off your Christmas tree, while someone is outside singing carols, and your favorite Hallmark Christmas movie in on TV and you just don't understand how it all looks so easy and everything comes out so perfect for them while it's utter chaos for you?

Maybe you've had to adjust to changes, suffered a loss, or a health issue, and the world of holly jolly goes merrily on its way while you're stuck in neutral. Maybe everything just feels ... off, so you're going through the motions feigning Christmas joy when it's a real struggle to join in. Getting into the swing of the season is harder than Aunt Mabel's fruitcake. (No offense, if you actually have an Aunt Mabel that makes great fruitcake.)

I'm no expert on what the Christmas spirit looks like or feels like but I think I can guess at a couple of things it's not... I don't think it's about wearing ourselves out baking, shopping, decorating, spending all of our efforts preparing and little time enjoying. All of those things are part of our Christmas experience but should not be the Christmas experience. I don't think Christmas spirit correlates to how much money we spend. Just for fun I Googled "How to catch the Christmas Spirit" to see what was suggested. The top few ideas were pretty consistent - listen to Christmas music and sing along, bake cookies, decorate the tree, bust out the reindeer and snowmen, and watch a Christmas movie. These aren't bad ideas necessarily but how many of these things actually speak to your soul?

Yesterday was Thanksgiving. We have now embarked on the "full" season. Full of turkey, stuffed with pie, plump little cherubs sing on high, crowded stores, sales galore, shop until your swollen feeties ache, and does anyone really like holiday fruitcake? Yep, it is without adoubt... the most wonderFULL time of the year.

In Galatians 4 Paul tells us "⁴ But when the fullness of the time came, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under the Law, ⁵ so that He might redeem those who were under the Law, that we might receive the adoption as sons and daughters." "In the fullness of time".... What does this mean? John F. MacArthur Jr., in his book <u>God With Us the Miracle of Christmas</u> states that "the fullness of time" is God's sovereign timing. He suggests that world events, as ordered by God, had made the people ripe for the advent of Christ. Politically the Roman Empire ushered in a time with good roads where people could travel more easily. Culturally, people were becoming more educated many knew both Greek and Latin. Spiritually, the world was diverse, but open. So... at the most opportune time, at the pinnacle of infrastructure, communication and open hearts... God sent His Son. I don't know who coined the phrase "God's timing is perfect" but this is certainly its best example.

What does the "fullness of time" have to do with finding the "Christmas spirit"? Maybe nothing... but I think maybe everything.... I think that if anything embodies the Christmas spirit it's Love. The reason the cookie baking, gift giving, tree decorating, carol singing and maybe even fruitcake helps us get in the Christmas spirit is because we do them with and for the people we love. Selfless acts of Love are the epitome of Christmas giving. Acts of Love help us to catch the Christmas spirit.

The Christmas spirit isn't a feeling you get upon completion of your yuletide tasks. It's the assurance of "God with us", Love, as it warms your heart. God sent Jesus when the world was ready to receive Him. I suspect, in the same manner, amid all of the clamor of the season, when the moment is right, when your heart is receptive, you will be filled with the spirit of Love and it will feel like Christmas.



With Christmas Carols

There's a stark difference between the tranquil, happiness-filled Christmas that companies market to us beginning every Black Friday, and the Christmas that many of us actually experience. If you are reading this blog post, you're certainly old enough to have experienced the difference. Remembering loved ones no longer there at the celebrations. Estrangements that

the holidays only magnify. Financial stress that the holidays exacerbate. If we're honest. I suspect that many of us sitting in church (not to mention those absent from church) struggle with the gap between the idealized Christmas, and the real holiday experiences of sadness, loss, or anxiety. The good news is that the biblical Christmas accounts for the difference. This is one more reason why Christians need to stick close to the hiblical meaning of Christmas, lest our "American cultural Christmas" set us up for amplified disappointment. Biblical Christmas is full

of *great hope*, but it hardly *resolves* the grief and suffering rooted in the world's sin. At least it doesn't resolve everything *yet*.

Just look at the Bible's Christmas narratives. Fear, danger, and trouble are woven into the accounts. Yes, the angels proclaimed, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!" But that hardly resolves all trouble. This trouble begins with the eternal Son of God becoming a baby, laid in a feeding trough in a backwater town, destined to die a criminal's death on a cross. He was born in exclusion, as there was no room

at the inn. He was likely born to impoverished parents, as indicated by their offering of two doves or pigeons, the poorest gifts permissible at the temple. In Luke 2, godly Simeon prophesied that the infant Jesus was the Messiah. But he also acknowledged that the coming of the Messiah meant the time had come for Simeon to die. ("Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in

> peace, according to your word.") He told Mary that "this child is appointed for the fall and rising of many in Israel, and for a sign that is opposed (and a sword will pierce through your own soul also), so that thoughts from many hearts may be revealed." A sword piercing Mary's soul? No wonder that the Song of Simeon (the "Nunc Dimittis") is a standard for funerals, not for Christmas services

Don't get me wrong: I would not advise your church to make this into "the most depressing Christmas ever"! But don't try to make it the "merriest Christmas ever," either.

Don't get out beyond what Scripture teaches about Christmas. The long-awaited Messiah has come, a stunning, seminal moment in the history of redemption. This incarnation leads the saints to rejoice and worship. But Jesus's earthly career had only begun, and the crucifixion still lay ahead. Not even Easter resolves all troubles and grief. At Christmas, we know that the time of complete resolution and reconciliation lies yet in the future, when God will wipe away the tears of the saints, "and death shall be no more, neither shall there be mourning, nor crying, nor pain anymore, for the former things have passed away" (Rev. 21:4).


