The good part is that church gets busier, too! Although, I don't think of that work as tedious.



I Will Pray For Gumbo

You may be thinking "why would I pray for gumbo?" If you listen to Jimmy Buffett's music you know he wrote a song titled "I Will Play For Gumbo" so my title is a take on that.

I was going thru notes on my phone the other day and found an old one that read "gumbo as a newsletter article: a little bit of

everything." I added it in 2019, but for some reason never wrote it. If you like gumbo (which I do) and have eaten a number of variations (which I have), then you know that no two bowls of gumbo are alike. While poking around online looking at various recipes and info about gumbo I ran across an article titled "Theological Gumbo" written by a UMC pastor named Stephen Fife. Look it up, it's a great read. I wish I had written it! <u>https://um-insight.net/perspectives/</u> theological-gumbo/ The rest of this article draws from both this article and my own notes.

Making a tasty bowl of gumbo may be very similar to making a healthy effective church. If you know much about gumbo you know that it all begins with the roux. Make a great roux and the rest of the ingredients are almost incidental to the result. If you look up gumbo recipes, you'll find that the ingredients are vast and varied including everything from file powder to okra. But it's the roux (with the few staples of roux making) that holds everything together, that pulls all of the individual flavors together, that provides the basis for a great dish. (Beginning to think I may need to make gumbo for dinner tonight!)


Let 's think about this in terms of the church. In his article Rev. Fife proclaims that: "We've lost our roux! Which begs the question: What is the roux of our church, or for that matter any Christian church, even the universal church? What is it that binds us all together? What pulls all of the individual "flavors" together providing the foundation of a great church? Just like each person has different gifts and graces so does each congregation. During our recent ministry audit we talked a lot about having a mission statement. Some might think having a common mission is the roux. But is it really? What is the impetus behind the mission? What is the reason we do what we do? Our problem is that we focus too much on the incidentals, ... the secondary ingredients, the offshoots instead of the roots. (Imagine watering the leaves of a plant rather than the roots...)

"¹⁶ For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." John 3:16. God's love, made manifest in the person of Jesus Christ who in the greatest act of Love, laid down His life for you, and for me. Jesus is the roux. Jesus' love holds us together. Jesus blends our individual "flavors" to make us an awesome bowl of church!

We are too often overly deliberate about selecting ingredients that are compatible, that we like, that don't offend, that fit the plan, that are predictable, and taste as expected. Just as some flavors seem opposite but are actually quite complimentary (think sweet and sour, or sugar and salt). We need to learn to appreciate our distinctiveness (both individually and collectively) and learn from each other instead of playing spiritual wack-a-mole. After all we are all equally beloved by God. Jesus died for all of us not just the ones we're comfortable with. We are made different by design, if we will love Jesus, the Holy Spirit will combine our different "flavors" into blessings according to His purposes.

Rather than finding opportunity in our unique gifts, seeing them as assets, we spend too much time distinguishing ourselves from each other, focusing on how we are unalike, that what binds us together (our roux) almost completely escapes us. Think about that – we spend so much time focusing on what divides us that we lose sight of Jesus (our roux). When we do that, we lose our flavor, we become watered down, bland and maybe burnt and bitter. Bland gumbo is disappointing, bitter gumbo is just bad.

The first rule of gumbo making is also the first requirement of an effective church... it starts with the roux. Begin with Jesus.
