### Churches I Have Known

Soon I won't be a pastor anymore. Oh, there will likely be some preaching opportunities in retirement and the occasional pastoral duty, but the day-to-day call and privilege of leading others towards spiritual growth and being part of significant moments in people's lives-such as marriages, illness, and death--will come to a close. Naturally this is a time of reflection.

Like many of you, I grew up in the church. Or I should say, "churches." Our family attended several churches over the years, and it is with fondness that I remember those spiritual homes. The Baptist churches really emphasized the need for a personal relationship with Christ, and the Bible was central in the preaching and teaching. It was important to have a "born-again" experience in order to know one was going to Heaven after death, or upon the Lord's return. And sharing our faith was important too, as the consequences of not being "saved" were most critical, and we didn't want others to perish.

The Mennonite church we attended between Baptist churches was so significant to me that I later spent much of my career serving Mennonite churches as a pastor. In those years, the Mennonites valued spending time with one another without TV, phones, or sports activities as distractions. Just going to someone's house for a meal after church and spending a few hours there in the afternoon was normal in those early years. Mennonites also put a great emphasis on living in peace and reconciliation with others (not always successful).

When I was in high school, we attended a Pentecostal church in Lockport, NY. Worship was a major theme of those years. And there were "altar calls," in which those in attendance would feel compelled to go to the front of the sanctuary as music played and "wait on the Lord." In New York City I was privileged to be a student intern at a church that had a dynamic and visionary pastor. That year had a huge impact on my life and ministry direction. Years of ministry in inner-city Buffalo involve so many stories, that I suppose I could write a book about that very special era.

Now as I look to the future, I desire to continue to be part of the church of Jesus Christ. I'm not much interested in denominational concerns, rules and regulations, or politics. I want to be a faithful attendee (most likely of an urban church), a support to the pastor, and be in a place where my faith can grow in a deeper way. This faith-journey never ends, does it?

Well, this is a short essay about my church experiences. To look back on life and not think about the churches along the way is unthinkable to me. I hope you too have had a spiritual and emotional connection to church in your life. May this next season of life be a time for making memories that have both earthly and heavenly rewards.



# A Few Random Thoughts on Discipleship...

The stated mission of The United Methodist Church is "to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world." Just exactly how we set out to do that results in vast and varied plans, programs, processes, procedures, and perspectives… every church is supposed to have a discipleship plan.

I've spent most of my work life as a Quality Assurance Manager and I can tell you unequivocally that you can have the most comprehensive, best practice, clearly documented programs and procedures but if you don't engage your people, if the people don't invest in it, believe in it, and care about it.... production of a quality product will be difficult, sporadic, and lackluster, at best

Here's the thing about discipleship - the call is simple - Go and make disciples...

Go and make disciples - What does go mean? It might mean physically relocating. It might simply mean be willing to be moved out of your comfort zone, minimally it means "do something."

Make – this is a little misleading – we don't actually make disciples... having a relationship with God does that... we encourage that relationship by telling folks about Jesus and what Jesus has done in our lives. By sharing our stories with vulnerability and authenticity. The truth is, we are often working out work our own discipleship when we tell others about Jesus. God is very economical – there is never just one blessing bestowed when we are faithful to God's leading.

What if genuine discipleship is less about having a clear and concise written plan and following structure and more like messy, imperfect people living life authentically, following wherever, whenever God leads them sharing the hope they have in Jesus in messy, imperfect ways?

Desire – many of us have had the feeling, maybe a poke, maybe an instinct, maybe a 2 x 4 up the side of our heads .... That God is calling us to something new, something a bit different, maybe something that feels uncomfortable...

How many of us answer God's call like Isaiah?

Here I am; send me... Isaiah 6

How many of us answer more like Moses?

Here I am; send someone else... Exodus 4

Encourage – We can tell people about Jesus. We can quote scripture, we can offer platitudes, canned answers, etc... but that's not really encouraging is it. It's more like informing and a little too impersonal, I think. I think we encourage when we come along side people in their walk with Jesus, supporting, sharing, investing in each other... yes, it is reciprocal.

A disciple understands that God's call in our lives is a continuous process of becoming...

As we perceive God's call, if we will pray about it and continue to seek God's guidance regarding it God will create with in us a desire for it... It is by this reality that we go from a feeling of dread, indecision, discomfort and just plain you gotta be kidding me... to getting excited about it and looking forward to this new adventure in Christ. This is how God works out His will in us... He plants the idea... the Holy Spirit moves us to pray about it and as we pray we make friends with the idea... it becomes less scary or challenging to us. A disciple responds in faith.
