



#### Disciple Profile: Judas—The Traitor

The most notorious of all the disciples is Judas Iscariot, the betrayer. His name appears last in every Biblical list of the apostles, except for in Acts 1, where it doesn't appear at all. The call of Judas in not found in scripture. Judas was as common as the rest, with no earthly credentials or characteristics that made him stand out from the group. He followed Jesus willingly, and like the others he left life as he knew it to follow Jesus. While he gave his life to Jesus, he never really gave Jesus his heart.

Judas chose to follow Jesus and he continued to follow even as it became difficult. Judas knew Jesus was a miracle worker and held power over the kingdom of darkness and the physical world. No one taught the way Jesus taught, spoke the way he spoke or lived the way he lived. But Jesus did not always fulfill his personal expectations. As he became more and more disillusioned, hiding his disappointment became harder. To be honest, his, theirs and our expectations are not always spiritually motivated.

The other eleven apostles are great encouragers to us because they exemplify how common people with typical failings can be used by God in uncommon ways. Judas however, serves as a warning to us about the dangers of spiritual carelessness. Even so, we must remember that while Judas chose to follow Jesus—Jesus also chose Judas. The tension between divine sovereignty and human choice is made manifest in Judas' calling. Judas was not coerced to betray Jesus, it was his choice.

MacArthur offers several lessons from the life of Judas. Among them is that Judas is a tragic example of lost opportunity. He walked with Jesus day in and day out for some 2 years... yet in the end Judas was damned because he failed to heed what he saw and what he heard. Another is that Judas is proof of the forbearing goodness of God. Even as Judas was betraying him, Jesus still called him "friend."





#### It Is What It Is

Above my desk I have a small block of wood that bears the words "It is what it is". Hopefully it doesn't offend my clients this time of year... We say and hear those words a lot don't we. It's our sort of fatalist response to life gone awry, our benign coping response to, well... stuff.

I remember when I, or just about anyone, would say "it is what it is" in conversation with my mother her response would almost always be, "but it will be what you make of it." She lived that motto in the last years of her life... having endured serious illness and at least 4 strokes she found great joy in feeding and watching the birds outside of her apartment window. She worked to regain her dexterity so that should could knit and make hats and wash cloths to donate to various causes. Funny thing... as I type this, I realize that it was 11 years ago today that she passed. Gertie, the peace lily that came to live with me after her memorial service has 4 blossoms in celebration.

"Life is what you make it", I don't know who coined that phrase, but they hit the nail on the head with it. I often share with the folks in Sunday school or a Bible study I'm leading that what they will get out of the study is directly proportional to what they put into the study. Life is like that as well.

To understand and get the maximum benefit from a study you need to put in the time. Read and research the material, participate in the small group discussion, ask questions, share ideas, and above all, pray for guidance and illumination!

Likewise, I think to make the most of our lives we need to pay attention to the little things. I think most of life occurs in the everyday stuff we tend to overlook. Be fully present in the moments of our lives. Put in the time, participate in the lives of not only those you choose but also those who God chooses for you. Be willing to share... and to receive (for this allows others to share.) Look for what binds us to each other and not so much what divides us. Pray for guidance and understanding! Receive and offer grace in all circumstances. In a book I'm currently reading the author suggests that we must "consent to evolve." I have long believed that one purpose of this life is to become the people we were made to be. To strip away all of the stuff we have "clothed" ourselves with to adorn ourselves or to cope with the "it is what it is" moments that happen when life resembles trying to hit a 76 mph curveball.

Next to prayer, consenting to evolve might be the most important means of becoming. We can memorize scripture, we can participate in church activities, we can pray, and we can offer compassion. But if we do all of that without allowing Jesus to work on, work in, and work through our hearts than we cannot/will not be transformed or fully become who we were made to be.

It is what it is.... and while there is some truth in that it will be what we make it, our lives can be so much more than we ever dreamed by allowing God to mold us and make us new. Want to make a life well lived? Pray. Be present. Pay attention. Share with others. Give and take grace. Consent to evolve.
