One Matters Award

Every year, Discipleship Ministries partners with Annual Conferences (AC) by offering the One Matters Award (OMA) to one eligible congregation at each Annual Conference. The award, consist-

ing of a commemorative plaque and a check for \$1,000.00 (one thousand dollars), is delivered to the congregation during the annual conference session.

OMA has a strong focus on making disciples because, by integrating into the church body, the individual may experience the personal transformation to potentially engage in the church's mission for the transformation of the world. While most Discipleship Ministries Programs focus on existing members, OMA focus on new members. After all, ONE Matters.

The Giving Table

Some years ago When Pastor Olga was here Alexis fixed up a picnic table and painted it turquoise. If memory serves (and I may not remember exactly right), Olga had read or was familiar with a book titled <u>The Turquoise Table: Finding Community</u> and Connection in Your Own Front Yard.

Thus, the table and benches were placed out near the sidewalk and occupied by various individuals for few hours a day a couple of days a week. The hope was that we could make new connections simply by sitting in "our" front yard and engaging people. Certainly some connection was made with folks in our community but ultimately the idea fizzled out whether as the air grew cooler or the idea of having time to stop and chat is a bit of a lost art as we navigate our busy lives.

As the turquoise table and benches sat in the front yard of the church they eventually found new uses. Parents would sit on the benches in the shade of the tress as they waited for their kids to get out of school. Or, kids would sit there and talk to their friends before heading for home after school.

At some point the table was moved to the back yard of the parsonage (probably for winter.) I believe Tim brought it back over and placed it along the side of the north parking lot where again it was used for waiting, chatting, gathering, etc.

I don't remember when it began but the people began putting things on the table that were free to the community. Items left from the pop-up food pantry, free items from Hope Resales and most gloriously – people began sharing their extra produce with the community.

Maybe to lesson here for us is to understand that our gifts and purposes evolve as we walk God's path for us. What we were 5 years ago has helped to prepare us for who and what were are today.

The table is old and worn out and we are looking to replace it. The new table may not be turquoise but it will certainly hold all of the generous offerings that people put on it to share with their brothers and sisters in the community.

Not long ago someone on FB referred to the table as the "Giving Table" and so it has become. It's a pretty cool story, one that blesses us and blesses the community. Many thanks to all who fill the table with such generous love!

Disciple Profile: Andrew—The Apostle of Small Things

Peter's brother Andrew is one of the least known for the four disciples considered the "lead" disciples. Although very much a leader, he remained mostly in the background. Andrew was the first of all disciples to be called and he had a particularly close relationship with Jesus because he was so often the means by which other people were personally introduced to Jesus. His eagerness to follow Christ combined with his zeal for introducing others to Him, fairly typifies Andrew's character.

Almost everything scripture tells us about Andrew shows that he had the right heart for effective ministry in the background. He did not seek to be the center of attention. He was not envious of those in the limelight. He did what he could with the gifts and the calling God gave him. He seemed to be the least contentious and mist thoughtful of the disciples.

Peter and Andrew, though brothers, had totally different leadership styles. Each was perfectly suited to their colling. Andrew could be considered the model for church leaders, Many called to ministry will labor in relative obscurity like Andrew as opposed to being renowned and prominent like Peter. When dealing with people Andrew fully appreciated the value of a single soul. Almost every time we see him in the gospels he is bringing someone to Jesus. Andrew was not hesitant when someone wanted to meet Jesus, he knew that Jesus would want to meet anyone that wanted to meet Him.

Some people see the big picture more clearly because they appreciate the value of small things. This can be seen in the feeding of the 5000. Jesus says "give them something to eat" the other disciple look around adding up their money and resources... but Andrew spoke up pointing out that there was a boy with 5 barley loaves and two small fish... you know the rest of the story. Andrew found one small food source, told Jesus about it and let Jesus do the rest. What an amazing example for us today!

Everything is Figureoutable



A couple of weeks ago, while visiting my sister in Reno, I was wandering through a souvenir store. I saw a sign that read "Everything is Figureouta-

ble!" I laughed, and then I pondered on it for a while because I was pretty certain I didn't believe it. Apparently I've thought about it enough that it's about to become my newsletter article.

What is it about humans that drives us to figure things out? Why do we think we need to know... everything? Al would tell you that our need to understand and "figure things" stems from a combination of factors; including our God given curiosity, a desire for control and security, and the need for validation and belonging. Sadly too often our quest for knowing ends at the point at which we're satisfied that we know enough or that we come to conclusions that agree with our sensibilities.

When we're young we are taught the basics about things and then encouraged to use what we're taught to reason out how to navigate our world. As we grow the teaching lessons often take a back seat but the expectations of understanding rise. We are expected to know things, not the least of which is, what to say and how to behave. Maybe we spend a lot of time thinking about the right response to a given situation... maybe we think too much, afraid of doing or saying the wrong thing. Maybe we don't spend enough time contemplating what we actually know versus what we only think we know. I don't know.

Similarly, our need to know affects our walk with Jesus. We feel a call to something as yet not fully defined... we're not sure so rather than put our best foot forward and wander further along the path with Jesus to see what develops, we stop and wait until we think we can see enough of the journey to be comfortable with it. The problem with that is we can never fully know and understand the path Jesus wants to walk with us, even if it looks predictable. But that's OK, we are called to walk in faith, not certainty. Nowhere in scripture are we told that we can know all there is to know.... about anything. In fact, in 1Corinthians 13 Paul tells us that we see through a glass darkly, which means not fully or clearly. What then do we do with our need to know the scoop before we act? Before we trust?

Borrowing from the Disciple Profile in this newsletter: Maybe we can learn something from Andrew about our "need" to know before we act. In John's gospel, Jesus asks his disciples where they could buy enough bread to feed the mass of people (5000) coming toward them. Philip starts counting their money and finds them lacking sufficient funds. Andrew though, notices a boy with five small loaves and two small fish. He tells Jesus about them wondering how far the meager rations will go in feeding the crowd. We know what happens next, Jesus takes the loaves and fishes, gives thanks for them, and passes then out. Everyone ate, and there was even some leftover.

What we learn from Andrew is to not rule anything out, precisely because we don't know... so many things, not the least of which is God's good and perfect Will. Not everything is figureoutable, it isn't meant to be, but Jesus is redoubtable, accountable, capable and trustable. Living out our calling with Jesus is an adventure that defies logic. The more we try to know it, understand it, or figure it out the further we stray from trusting that because of Jesus, we are able do what needs to be done, to experience the all things work together for good promise of following Christ. While we contemplate it, count the cost, or wait for the full plan to unfold... or even while we ask God to give us a sign that the inkling we're feeling is legit.... All that's needed to see the glory of God is to simply offer what we have when we're asked to put it to use. And trust me... there will be leftovers.
